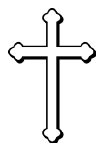


BECOMING PROPHETS

There used to be show on television called Dirty Jobs hosted by Mike Rowe. He would go around the country trying out jobs that were literally dirty, jobs that the average person would not even consider doing. They are jobs or positions that no one wants and so we say that they are unpopular. In the Old Testament, one of the roles in society that was unpopular was that of the Prophet. The prophet was an individual that was chosen by God to speak his word to his people. The reason this position was so unpopular was that the word that God gives the prophet to speak to his people was always a difficult one. The people would often not receive the message well and so many prophets suffered persecution, violence and even death. But the job of the prophet was essential to the health and wellbeing of the faith community. Knowing what would happen to them if they accepted the call of becoming a prophet, those called were often reluctant to undertake the mission. And yet because the loved God they would allow the Spirit of God to enter them and move them forward to accomplish the impossible.

And just as Ezekiel in the first reading is called to prophesy we too are called. The only difference is that we are ALREADY prophets by virtue of our baptism. At baptism we became priests, prophets and kings. Now more than ever is the ministry of our prophetic identity necessary. We are being sent into the world. What must we do to be prophets? We must allow the Spirit of the Lord to do with us as He wishes. In the coming weeks we will learn more about the prophets so we to may be who we were created to be.

But in between we hear Saint Paul, probably the foremost Christian missionary, blessing God for all that God has done for us. We are still and always a missionary people, facing hardships but knowing the richness of God’s grace.

STEWARDSHIP THOUGHTS

In today’s Scripture readings, those called forth to accomplish God’s work experience difficulty completing their mission. God directs the prophet Amos, *a shepherd and a dresser of sycamore trees*, to prophesy to the Israelites in spite of the priest Amaziah’s opposition. In St. Mark’s Gospel, Jesus sends forth the Twelve Apostles, in the spirit of evangelization, to preach repentance, cure the sick, and drive out demons. He forewarns that they will encounter resistance and even rejection. St. Paul reminds us of the Father *Who has blessed us in Christ with every spiritual blessing in the heavens! ... and through Christ Jesus to be His adopted heirs*. As faithful stewards, we know the cost and sacrifice of discipleship. Our efforts to do God’s will may be resisted or rejected. However, the Lord’s gift of grace strengthens us to carry out His work regardless of the obstacles we may face. To help discover God’s will, set aside a few minutes of quiet time each day to listen to the Lord.



NATURAL FAMILY PLANNING

“Celebrate God’s Gift of Married Love” is the theme of National NFP Awareness Week 2018, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops’ annual campaign to celebrate God’s design for married love and the gift of life and raises awareness of NFP methods.

Gifts to the Catholic Services Appeal allow the archdiocesan Office for Natural Family Planning to offer classes in and presentations about NFP methods, as well as a monthly “Deeper Reflections” support series for couples.

NFP Awareness Week 2018, held July 22-28, also highlights the 50th anniversary of *Humanae Vitae*, the papal encyclical which articulates Catholic beliefs about human sexuality, conjugal love, and responsible parenthood. To kickoff the week, the Natural Family Planning Office is hosting a family picnic with the Couple to Couple League at the VFW Park in Royal Oak from 1-4 p.m. on Sunday, July 22. 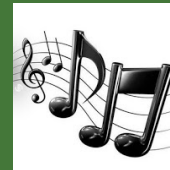
